Last Saturday, I spoke to the group of players about a new policy regarding bad behavior. The new

policy is that any bad behavior that comes to the attention of the director (for social bridge players, this the bridge referee) will be penalized by losing 1/4 of the match points of the board currently in play. A second offense in the same game merits losing a 1/2 board. The director's decisions are final and cannot be overturned on appeal.

The new policy was voted on and won enthusiastic support. A list of examples of bad and good behavior along with this policy are on the bulletin board and I will post them on the web site in the unit pages.
